



I am from the forsythia bush


the Dutch elm

NOW...

Ex. My list: Lake Worth, suburbs, beaches, maracuya (passion fruit juice), tostones, plantains, first-ever Thanksgivings, two generations of single mothers, overgrown houseplants, backyard Muscovy "turkey" ducks, "Spanglish," mini SUVs, (...)

WRITE A POEM...

<u>Using your list</u> of where you're from. You may use George Ella Lyon's model and start your piece with "I am from," or you may take it in any direction you'd like.

Tip: Don't worry too much about your poem being "good" or having beautiful figurative language. Write what comes to you first and trust your gut; the metaphors will then naturally follow.
