

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## FLORIDA, NATION LOSE RECORDS MANAGEMENT PIONEER


Edward N. Johnson, one of the nation's most respected leaders in the development of records

management, died May 12 in Tallahassee. Mr. Johnson, who guided Florida's archives and records management programs through their infancy as Chief of the Bureau of Archives and Records Management, was 80 years old.

A native of
Washington, D.C., Mr.
Johnson served as an
archivist at the National
Archives. In his long
career of government
service, he also served
as Operations Advisor
to the Commissioner of
Immigration and
Naturalization and as
Assistant Director for
Alien Registration. He
was a Foreign Service
Officer with postings as

Public Administration Advisor to the governments of Iran and Tunisia. At the National Archives he was responsible for the government-wide evaluation of federal agencies' efforts to control and manage paperwork. In 1978, he led President Carter's Task Force on Archives and Records Management.

He was chairman of the National Advisory Committee on the Management, Preservation, and Use of Local Government Records during that group's period of planning and organization. In



addition, he chaired the Policy Board for the National Information Center for Local Government Records.

After designing, implementing, and heading the archives and records management programs for the State of Florida, he left the grind of day-to-day operations of state government and served as Executive Director of ARMA, International and was a visiting Fellow in information management

at the Royal Melbourne Institute in Australia. Other teaching credits include an adjunct professorship at

Florida State
University; an
instructor at the
University of Teheran,
Iran; and as workshop
director for the Center
for Science and
Technology at American
University.

He was a Certified Records Manager, a Fellow of the Society of American Archivists, a member of Florida's State Historical Records Advisory Board, and winner of the 1976 Leahy Award for professional contributions to the field of records management.

Those of us who had the privilege of working with Ed Johnson can appreciate on a personal

level the contribution this gentleman made to our profession. Archivists and records managers around the world have lost a mentor, teacher, and friend.

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
